

#### THRIVE UPDATES

#### **FAMILY THRIVE AFTERNOON**

We have held a Family Thrive for our Year 6 and 7 pupils where we invited families into our Friday afternoon Thrive. During this time parents and carers participated in the lesson where we looked at the triune brain and how it works. We talked about our instinctual brain, our emotional brain and our cognitive (thinking) brain. We used play-doh to create this and talked about how our brain reacts in certain situations.

Year 6 then thought about what happens when we "flip our lid" and our thinking brain disconnects from our emotional brain. We discussed the role of the amygdala and hippocampus - which are key parts of our brain. Pupils and parents enjoyed creating their play-doh brains, while learning more about managing our emotions.

Thrive School of Excellence 2022

Year 7 looked at the adolescent brain and discussed how it changes as we become teenagers. We also looked at the chemical changes that take place and how this also impacts teenagers. Pupils and parents experienced some of our Thrive techniques and 'ways in' to talking about our emotions, such as metaphor check-ins.

#### FAMILY THRIVE HALLOWEEN CRAFT AFTERNOON

On Monday 23rd October we invited some of our families in to participate in a Family Thrive Halloween Craft Afternoon. We carved pumpkins and created our own pumpkin designs with paints. It was a lovely afternoon.



#### WORLD SPACE WEEK CAREERS TALK

On Friday 6th October, Year 7 and 8 pupils recognised World Space Week with a virtual space talk. The guest speaker, Dr Vicky Fawcett is an astronomer from Newcastle University. She discussed how to become an astronomer (sharing her career pathway) and explained her research into black holes.

Following the virtual talk, pupils were given the opportunity to ask Dr Fawcett further questions. Pupils were also given the opportunity to discuss their own career thoughts and research the pathways into those careers.

Pupils said "she explained the facts very well" and they found "telescopes and her educational journey interesting."



#### TT ROCK STARS

Monday 25th September marked the return of TT Rockstar day. Year 5 pupils looked incredible as they came into school dressed as rock stars. Thank you to parents and carers for helping create superb costumes.

Throughout the exciting day, pupils participated in many times tables activities, including logging on to TT Rockstars and setting up their avatar. The inspiration day was in preparation for 'Rock-tober', where each maths group go head-to-head

in an online TT Rockstar Battle-of-the-Bands. Therefore, they were also introduced to their "band manager" who guided them through the first band battle throughout October.


#### **BATTLE OF THE BANDS**

The pupils really enjoyed the event and it helped to give them some experience of leadership early in the school year.





#### **TRIPS**

#### **HOUSES OF PARLIAMENT**

Parkside had the privilege of taking 30 excited Year 7 pupils to the Houses of Parliament last week. During our visit we had a tour of the Houses of Parliament and learnt about how it was once the palace of Henry VIII. We were able to go into the House of Lords and also the House of Commons, seeing where the debates between MPs take place. We then had the unique opportunity to take part in a debating workshop inside the Commons - showing the potential of some of our pupils as a future career in politics! We also learnt about how a Bill eventually becomes a law.



Whilst in London, we took the opportunity for some sightseeing of famous landmarks, including Buckingham Palace, Big Ben and also Westminster Abbey.

The day was a rare opportunity for our pupils to see where our Government is conducted and was a unique chance to learn more about the Citizenship curriculum of the rule of law and how democracy operates in our country. The pupils benefited substantially from this experience and represented Parkside in an exemplary way.

#### **BLACK COUNTRY MUSEUM**

Our recent visit to the Black Country Living Museum with our pupils was an unforgettable educational experience that transported us back in time to the heart of the Industrial Revolution. The pupils saw history brought to life as they participated in a Victorian school lesson, met historical characters who showed them what it was like to live and work in the first industrialised landscapes in Britain and explored reconstructed shops, workplaces and houses. They experienced a trip on the canal to see for themselves what life was like for miners and children. The pupils had many questions throughout the day and fully embraced all that the museum had to offer.



#### KINDNESS—A LEGACY OF THE HOLOCAUST

We are delighted to report that our recent Year 8 school trip to deepen our understanding of the Holocaust was a resounding success, providing our students with a truly unforgettable experience. The outing centred around a performance of 'Kindness: A Legacy of the Holocaust', a play based on the incredible testimony of Hungarian Holocaust survivor Susan Pollack OBE.

Our pupils had the unique opportunity to witness this powerful production, which delves into the depths of history, sharing stories of resilience, love, and survival during the Holocaust. It was truly a once-in-a-lifetime experience that left a profound impact on all who attended.

Following the emotionally charged performance, students engaged in a stimulating panel discussion with the talented actors, as well as the director and writer, Cate Hollis and Susan Pollack herself. This allowed them to gain further insights into the creative process behind the play and deepen their understanding of this important historical period.



#### WARWICK CASTLE

On 21st September, Year 7 went on a history trip to Warwick Castle. Warwick Castle is a medieval castle developed from a wooden fort, originally built by William the Conqueror during 1068. Pupils climbed the towers and when they reached the top saw the fantastic views of Warwick! The whole of Year 7 were exemplary throughout the day in terms of their participation and their behaviour. They got to experience a War of the Roses tour, learnt about the history of the castle, discovering how it was built and what castle life was like throughout the years. We also thoroughly enjoyed the recently reinstated



trebuchet show - a phenomenon of fire, ammunition and history, as well as the falcon show where we saw birds with wingspans of up to 9 feet!

Notable comments from pupils included, "I've never seen anything like this before in my life!" and "This is the best trip that I have ever been on!"

A hugely successful trip that was enjoyed by pupils and staff alike.

#### HATE CRIME AWARENESS EVENT

On Thursday 19th October, 17 Year 8 pupils attended a Hate Crime Awareness Event at Parkside Council Offices, focusing on the effects of Hate Crime and how we can support people in our community who find themselves a victim of these crimes. They were treated to a special performance from the About Face Theatre Company, who, through the medium of drama, portrayed a real-life story of how an everyday train journey turned into something entirely different. Our pupils were a credit to the school, and they thoroughly engaged with the company, offering sensible and mature comments on what they had witnessed and how things could have played out differently. The organisers were impressed with the maturity shown and the answers given.

We look forward to sharing our experience of this event with the rest of the school community.

### FOOD, GLORIOUS, FOOD!

Back in Spring, Mrs Ford, with the help of pupils attending Gardening Club, transformed the school garden. They planted a variety of vegetables and during this half term we have harvested our crops. We have been very pleased with our efforts and are looking forward to the next cycle of growing more vegetables! (We definitely think we have green fingers!)





#### SCHOOL COUNCIL

This year our school council looks slightly different...

We have joined an exciting project called Smart School Councils where the key ethos is that every child has a voice and any idea is worth sharing. The 'council' is made up of every person in the school. We have a 'Communication Team' who work behind the scenes to listen to suggestions, plan questions for our weekly class meetings and who are responsible for helping any pupil in the school to 'action' their ideas. Our Communication Team are there to support our pupils to all take an active role in our School Council and community.

To be a member of the Communication Team, pupils had to complete an application form and were selected by their Heads of Year. Whilst we will meet as a team twice each half term, each member of the team will be working hard to listen to the ideas of our pupils and to put these ideas into action. Even if pupils aren't on the Communication Team, they still have the opportunity to make a difference by joining an Action Team enabling them to lead change.

Every week, during Talk Time, our pupils will use the Class Meeting tool to discuss questions and ideas that are linked to our themes of the week. Our pupils have relished this opportunity so far this term, with form tutors commenting on how much the pupils are enjoying their Talk Time. At the end of every class meeting, pupils can contribute ideas for actions that they feel would make our school better.
