At lunchtime, students had an opportunity to try out the drums, ukulele and glockenspiels earning themselves house points for the riffs and beats that they played.




#### SUPPORTING THE REES FOUNDATION

#### **SUMMER 2025 UPDATE**

It is hard to believe that this academic year is ending. While the summer break offers a welcome break for many, it can also bring its own challenges.

For many children the holiday period can bring about a shift in children's routines, leading to more time spent online and more social interactions, both in-person and virtual. This unstructured time, while offering opportunities for creativity and rest, also comes with potential risks such as:

- Increased screen time without clear boundaries or supervision.
- Exposure to online risks, including cyberbullying, inappropriate content, or contact with strangers.
- Social pressures and conflicts, especially during gatherings or on social media.
- Lack of emotional support, since teachers and school staff aren't as readily available to notice and address issues.

Some pupils might be feeling as the end of term approaches.

We have to remind pupils of the following:

- Who they can talk to in school if they need help or support, or have worries about the upcoming holidays.
- Where they can go for help or support during the school holidays:
- Anyone under 19 can call **Childline** on 0800 1111 or use Childline's **1-2-1 counsellor chat**, anytime, day or night.
- **Shout** (in partnership with **Place2Be**) provides free, confidential text messaging for young people and parents/carers. Just text 'Shout' to 85258
- They can call 999 if they have serious safety concern or in an emergency.

Here are a few proactive strategies to help safeguard children's wellbeing during the holidays:

- Set clear boundaries around screen time and online activity.
- Have open conversations about internet safety and respectful online behaviour.
- Encourage offline activities, like reading, sports, or creative hobbies.
- Stay involved by checking in regularly about how children are spending their time and who they're interacting with.

For some, the summer holidays will be spent using the internet to keep in touch with friends, catch up with the latest apps and online trends, and play their favourite games.

#### Sit down together

For parents, the summer holidays are a great chance to sit down with your children. Together you can visit their favourite sites and play their favourite games, this is a great way to stay up to date with online lives and show them that you're interested in what they are doing.

The holidays are also a good opportunity to have positive conversations about the internet, so if something ever does upset your child online, they would feel more confident in confiding in you.



#### Social media and staying in touch

During the summer holidays, young people may want to keep in touch with their friends through social networking sites or games. It's a good time to ask them about what sites they use and check any age requirements as many social media sites require users to be at least 13-years-old.

Encourage your children to use the privacy tools on the services they use, so that the content they post is only available to people they know and trust in real life.

You can also download the UK Safer Internet Centre's safety checklists for popular sites such as Instagram, Snapchat and Facebook.

#### Talking about their time online

The holidays are also a good opportunity to talk to your children about their online friendships, the sites they use and encourage best practices online.

#### **Sharing holiday pictures**

Some children may want to share photos and videos of what they are getting up to in their summer holidays online. Talk to your children about what types of photos are appropriate to share, and who they are okay to share with. Photos can hold cues that give away personal information. For example, if you share a selfie of you and friends, are there any landmarks or street signs that give away your location? This is true for photos you might share of your children too! It's always worth asking children if they are happy with an image you want to share online.

The Safer Internet Day research found that 2 in 5 (40%) of 8-17s said that in the last year their parents or carers have posted a photo of them that embarrassed them, rising from 34% of 8-12s to 46% of 13-17s.

#### Making a family agreement

A family agreement is a great way to start a conversation with your whole family about how you all use the internet and discuss together how to behave in a positive way when online at home, at school or at a friend's house. The agreement involves generating promises, these are positive statements about how your family want to look after each other online and how you should treat others online. The summer can be one of the best times to sit down as a family and agree these promises together.

As pupils spend more time out and about in the local community during the summer, it is helpful to consider contextual risks so that we help young people stay safer in less supervised environments. The support safety in the community, I have attached some useful resources that may be helpful:

#### SCHOOL UNIFORM

S&H Schoolwear and Sports offer a flexible "Put By" scheme to help budget for uniform purchases and also hold the Autism Friendly Award, offering autism friendly appointments in a calm, quiet environment for those who need it.



We also have uniform available at the Age UK shop on Broad Street and NewStarts on Sherwood Road if you would like some 'pre-loved' items. They also welcome donations of uniform in good, clean condition.

#### **PARKING**

Our main car park gates close between 8:40am and 9:15am and 3:00pm and 3:30pm each day. Please can we also remind parents and carers to be mindful that the car park is for staff, visitor use and drop off only.

#### **ROAD SAFETY**

Please may we remind pupils of road safety and sensible conduct on the way to and from school, remembering to use the zebra/pelican crossings when arriving/leaving school. Local residents have raised concerns wanting our pupils to stay safe.

#### **BICYCLES**

If your child wishes to cycle to school, please ensure they follow the highway code. When arriving at school pupils can lock the bicycle away safely in the bike shed. When leaving school, please can all pupils push their bike until off the school site before cycling away safely to protect Parkside and Meadows pupils and parents.

#### **MEDICATION**

Should pupils require medication in school, a medical consent form should be completed and signed by parents and carers. Please note we are unable to give medication unless it is in the original packaging with instructions. We keep a small amount of Calpol in school for emergencies. If you know your child may require Calpol in school, please bring in a supply for us to use. If your child has pierced ears, please can we ask that you supply tape for them to use in PE for health and safety reasons.



#### LUNCHTIME

From September, Lunchtime meals will now be £2.73, pupils can also buy a drink to go with their meal at an additional cost.

If pupils are bringing their own sandwiches, please remember to bring in a drink. If you are entitled to FSM, please apply even if your child does not want the meals, as additional funding is made available for the school for other purposes, which will benefit your child.

#### **END OF THE SCHOOL DAY**

Can we remind Parents/Carers that school finishes at 3:15pm. For safeguarding reasons, if you are unable to collect your children at the end of the school day, please make alternative arrangements for them to be picked up at this time or use Castle Kids Care Club. Our staff are not in a position to be able to supervise your children after school, and it is not appropriate for them to be sat waiting in reception.
